From the Principal's Desk

Welcome back to everyone for Term 4 and what will be a busy eight weeks in the lead up to Christmas. This term Year 12 students started their HSC examinations, and it has been nice to see the positive approach that they have taken in what are an important part of their lives as they transition to post school options. I look forward to celebrating with them at the upcoming formal in a few weeks time.

At the beginning of the term, I also had the opportunity to speak with our new Year 12 students for 2024. On that day they received important information regarding assessment and the expectations for their final year. All students were given the opportunity to participate in our staff mentoring program and this program will provide support for students as they navigate their way through the final year at school.

This term we also saw the statewide ban on mobile phone use in schools introduced. South Grafton High School has had a policy and procedure in place for several years which did not require any changes to be compliant with the new rules. What I would ask is that students and parents are aware that the use of the Yondr pouches whilst at school is the only way that students are able to have their device with them during the day. Students will initially receive a warning if found using their phone, a formal caution on the second occasion and a possible suspension on the third occasion. A copy of the school's policy will be emailed to all parents next week and a link to the Department of education's policy was recently posted on our Facebook page.

The STARs Aboriginal Girls Mentoring program has officially started, and it has been fantastic to have Lisa Laurie and Sherrie-Lee Redigar on board to work with our Aboriginal girls. Whilst our purpose-built building is not due for completion until early 2024, the program will start immediately with more information for parents and students wanting to participate available over the coming weeks. Lisa and Sherrie-Lee have already spoken to many of the girls to provide an insight into what the program can offer them and the opportunities it will provide. This is an exciting opportunity, and I would like to thank those within the school and community who have fought to see this program

Last May, the State Government established the education hardship fund for students to support their education recovery after the floods. Schools in the Clarence Valley were identified to receive this money. The Education Hardship Fund provided \$500 for each of our students. The funds were transferred to each student's school account and appear on statements as 'unallocated credit'. **These funds must be used by the end of October 2023.**

Many of our families currently have a balance remaining and we ask, for your child's benefit, that you please spend the credit before the due date. After this date, the funds will not be accessible. We have included below some options for your consideration.

To find out how much flood funding you have remaining, please refer to your Parent Portal or contact us for details on the unallocated credit figure.

Funds can be spent on: School Uniform; School Hats; Book packs for Years 7 and 8; Calculators, Excursions, Heron Island Excursion; Year 12 Formal; Year 11 Jerseys; Elective Fees; Subject related costs i.e. skate board deck; Part payment towards a laptop.

Please note that the funds cannot be used for voluntary school contributions, nor can they be 'cashed out' or withdrawn for personal use.

Do you have the new School Bytes App and the School Bytes Parent Portal?

Activating the School Bytes App

1. Access the app store on your phone and search for School Bytes.

If you can't find it, here are the direct links:

Android: https://play.google.com/store/apps/details?id=education.schoolbytes

- 2. Download the School Bytes App.
- 3. Use your username and password created previously to log on.
- 4. If prompted, allow notifications.

School Bytes provides a parent portal to help your school communicate with you. This is accessible via a website and an App, available for both Apple and Android devices.

SGHS uses the parent portal for various things, including online permission notes, attendance, and payments, which can be accessed via a secure link. The School Bytes parent portal enables you to view all your children in one portal and process payments for multiple siblings in one transaction, even if they attend different schools (assuming all of the schools use School Bytes!).

IMPORTANT – To ensure that the registration process works smoothly and you can link your account to your child(ren), make sure that you use the same email address that you have provided to the school or if using a different email address, an SMS verification code will be sent to the mobile phone number on record for you at the school.

Detailed steps

- 1. Open the parent portal link https://portal.schoolbytes.education/auth/login
- 2. Select the create a new account link.
- 3. Enter your first name as it appears on your student's profile at the school.
- 4. Enter your last name as it appears on your student's profile at the school.
- 5. Enter the email address that you use for school communication.
- 6. Enter a password.
- 7. Confirm the password.
- 8. Select create account.

An email will be sent to the email address nominated so that you can verify your access to the email address. Once you have created your account, log in to the School Bytes parent portal.

You can now link your account to all students in schools that use the School Bytes platform.

- 1. Select link other student.
- 2. Search for the school's name.
- 3. Enter the student's first name.
- 4. Enter the student's last name.
- 5. Select the student's current grade.
- 6. Enter the student's date of birth.
- 7. Select search.

Please also enable Notifications and check in the documents tab for the latest newsletter.

If all student information matches with parent information according to the student's official enrolment stored at the school, the system will add the student to the parent account automatically.

If you are unable to link a student to your account or if you have any questions relating to this process please contact the school.

The Learning Hub



One of the support programs we have at SGHS is The Learning Hub, previously called STAR. The Learning Hub, located in the library support to provides



mainstream students in a variety of ways, focusing on tutoring and literacy. In the Learning Hub we assist students to improve their literacy skills through our Reading Tutor Program (MultiLit), which is a structured program to support students who require extra literacy skills. SLSOs (School Learning Support Officers) withdraw students to work individually with them. Student progress is recorded to track their reading improvement. We also support students to complete assessment

tasks throughout the year and provide a supportive place for students when required. Learning and Support Teachers, Classroom Teachers and Year Advisors may identify students who need this extra support to complete current assessment tasks and N Awards. Students may also request support by speaking with the Learning and Support Teachers directly. An appropriate time will then be organised with the classroom teacher and the student to complete assessment tasks. Mainstream SLSOs also provide in-class support and assistance to hundreds of students across most subjects within the school.



Transport Concession Entitlement Cards

Guide to school student concession cards

If you're a student aged 16 years or older and eligible for concessions, the Transport Concession Entitlement Card serves as proof of entitlement when using a Child/Youth Opal card within the Opal network or when traveling on child or concession fares in NSW.

The Transport Concession Entitlement Card replaces the following cards:

Senior Secondary Student Concession Card (16 years and over) – also issued to Mature Secondary Students (18 years and over), Distance Education Students and Home School Students.

Proof of Age card (when a student under 16 years of age looks older) Boarders Rail Pass

To travel on a Child/Youth Opal card or a child/concession ticket, students must carry a concession entitlement card.

Children aged between 4 to 15 years do not require a proof of entitlement for concession travel. However, if they look more mature, they can get a Transport Concession Entitlement Card to verify to authorised officers that they are under 16 years old.
